For those of you who did not see my message on facebook, here it is:

IMPORTANT NEWS TO THE THIRD MARINE DIVISION ASSOCIATION. The U.S. Mail/United States Postal Service is no longer guaranteeing non-profits' mail delivery. I have in my hand a document showing the latest CALTRAP delivery status. Of the 1516 CALTRAP newsletters dropped in the post office for in-country delivery back in April, (overseas not in this number) so far only 269 have been scanned for delivery. Quite a few of those were scanned for delivery as late as this month of June. For instance, there are 21 hubs, called network distribution centers. An example of how poor their service is, the hub of Springfield, MA received 101 CALTRAPS and so far

have scanned none, that's ZERO, for delivery. New Jersey hub got 96 CALTRAPS and none have been scanned for delivery. Jacksonville, FL got 120 CALTRAPS and have scanned 20 for delivery. Bottom line, of the 1516 CALTRAPS in the post office hubs around the country, they have scanned a total of 269 CALTRAPS for delivery. That's 17%. The rest of them are just sitting around somewhere in those hubs. Very disappointing and very frustrating.

Manager Roger Bacon and I are looking at alternative options. Perhaps the most viable is to ask the Association who would like to get their CALTRAP via email. There are lots of members who do not have that option. Perhaps we pay more postage for those to hopefully be delivered.

You can go online at <u>caltrap.org</u> or <u>caltrap.com</u> and print out the CALTRAP now.



I see that Ken Hicks, who was with D/1/3, also has a of July birthday. He was there on Operation Buffalo too, maybe some of those incoming rounds were for him. With the 3rd Marine Division Reunion in Fort Worth, Texas, just over 10 weeks away, I wanted to mention that I hear from a lot of Marines and Corpsmen that they plan to attend. It should be a good and fun time for all. I have heard from a few, that they would like to come to the reunion, but their health does not allow it. 1 encourage all those that are able to travel, to attempt to attend the reunion. The Association has lost many members the past two years. I heard from the son of one Marine, that his Dad had planned to attend the Washington DC Reunion last year. That reunion was canceled due to covid, and he passed away last year. That was going to be his first Reunion. The Korean War was a war between North Korea, with military support from China and the Soviet Union, and South Korea, backed by personnel from the United Nations. The war began on 25 June 1950 when North Korea invaded South Korea following clashes along the border and insurrections in the south. The war ended unofficially on 27 July 1953 in an armistice. It resulted in the death of three million people and caused massive destruction of property.



Inchon September 15, 1950, during the Korean War U.S. Marines made a surprise amphibious landing at the strategic port of Inchon, on the west coast of Korea, about 100 miles south of the 38th parallel and 25 miles from Seoul.



INSURMOUNTABLE ODDS. UNFORGIVING CONDITIONS. UNYIELDING COURAGE.

On Thanksgiving Day 1950, American-led United Nations troops were on the march in North Korea. U.S. Marine and Air Force pilots distributed holiday meals, even to those on the front lines. Hopes were high that everyone would be home by Christmas. But soon after that peaceful celebration, American military leaders, including General Douglas MacArthur, were caught off guard by the entrance of the People's Republic of China, led by Mao Zedong, into the five-month-old Korean War.

Twelve thousand men of the First Marine Division, along with a few thousand Army soldiers, suddenly found themselves surrounded, outnumbered and at risk of annihilation at the Chosin Reservoir, high in the mountains of North Korea.

The two-week battle that followed, fought in brutally cold temperatures, is one of the most celebrated in Marine Corps annals and helped set the course of American foreign policy in the Cold War and beyond. Incorporating interviews with more than 20 veterans of the campaign, The Battle of Chosin recounts this epic conflict through the heroic stories of the men who fought it.



For the ground Marines, supported by 1st Marine Aircraft Wing squadrons, the fighting continued until the last day of the war, 27 July 1953. The Korean War marked the first real test of Free World solidarity in the face of Communist force. During the first week of July, combat outposts Berlin and East Berlin in the 7th Marines right regimental sector came under attack during the Marines' relief of the U.S. Army 25th Infantry Division. The Marines did not concede any key terrain, and at 10 p.m. on July 27, 1953, the lengthy truce negotiated at Panmunjom finally went into effect, ending three years of fighting in Korea.





TO BE A MARINE

Bill Ervin delivered this speech at our 2004 Reunion and it remains relevant today!

Ladies and gentlemen, excuse me if I pause a bit. The view from here is truly incredible. It is difficult to comprehend the amount of history that is gathered here tonight. What I see are not the people who wrote our nation's history, I see the Marines who made it. I look out and see the face of pride. The pride that radiates throughout this room is the richest kind of pride. It is the pride that has been earned. I am damn proud to be a part of this organization of honorable men.

I look out here and I see the men who sacrificed so much in the stinking swamps of Bougainville, the men who displayed tremendous courage on the black sands of Iwo Jima, I see the men who froze in the bitter cold of Pusan and Inchon. I see the Marines who made me want to become a Marine. Because of you, I found myself standing tall on the yellow footprints in San Diego in 1968. I can forgive you for that now. Will those Marines who served during the 40's and the 50's please stand.

I look out there and I see my brothers. Those I knew when I was a young and scared Marine away from home for the first time in my life in that distant land called Vietnam. At a time when the motives were not clear, when the decisions were not popular, these men stood up and offered their all in the name of Freedom. There is something sacred about men who you trust without reservation. Men you can depend on without question. Men who will share everything they have, unless it is a can of sliced peaches. My time in the Corps was brief but the lessons I learned from these brave men have been a major part of my life. I will never forget you, my brothers in arms. Will those Marines who served during the 60's and 70's please stand.

We are also honored to have with us tonight Marines who served during a time when the world was changing so fast that no one knew where the next threat would come from. These men and women prepared themselves to answer the call no matter where took them. From Panama to Bosnia, to Lebanon to Kuwait, from Afghanistan to Iraq, our Marines demonstrated to the world that the United States stood true in its resolve to defend freedom for all who cherished it. And many Marines paid the supreme sacrifice in this effort. Will those Marines who served during the 80's and 90's please stand.

Along with this history, I also see the hope of the future. We have with us this evening Marines who have taken our standards and carry them forward. These young men and women are part of a new world. A world full of new challenges with a new set of rules. But the vision and hopes of these men and women are the same. They want to be free and are willing to defend this freedom no matter how difficult the task. At a time of so much uncertainty, we are able to sleep at night, secure in the knowledge that these people are standing watch. I would like the Marines who are active duty to stand so that we can show them they are appreciated.

In closing, I want to say that whether you are part of the Old Corps or the New Corps, you are The Corps. The ribbons we wear on our chests may be different and the uniforms have changed some over the years. But one thing we wear will always remain the same. We all wear the title United States Marine.

You are my brothers and I will remain Semper Fidelis.

Jones each year and there have been thirteen awards totaling \$18,600.00 for deserving students commencing in the 2008 – 09 academic year.

Applications for the next academic year will be available on the Association website in December 2021.

OKINAWA, Japan – The heavy blades of helicopters thud overtop of the thick jungle canopy where hundreds of U.S. Marines silently maneuver through the stifling terrain to gain a positional advantage against a peer-level adversary. Meanwhile, a platoon of Marines executes an amphibious assault into another remote part of the jungle – swiftly navigating through nearly 20 nautical miles of turbulent coastal waters, flanking the enemy, and immediately entering the fight to control the

key maritime terrain. With sweat pouring silently down every green and brown-striped face, the Marines relentlessly battle against their foe across an island filled with mountains, mud, and dense vegetation where heat and humidity radiate endlessly.

These were but a taste of the scenes during the Jungle Warfare Exercise (JWX) spearheaded by 4th Marine Regiment, 3d Marine Division supported by elements from across III Marine Expeditionary Force and the Joint Force on Okinawa 24-28 May. This unscripted force-on-force exercise featuring more than 800 Marines operating in the field centered on the Northern Training Area (NTA) as its natural characteristics reflect much of the terrain within the islands of the Indo-Pacific region.

The exercise pitted two reinforced infantry companies against each other, one from 2d Battalion, 2d Marines, the other from 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, simulating a realistic fight across multiple domains against a thinking, adapting, peer-level adversary in distributed jungle and littoral environments. Marines from both units spent countless hours sharpening their skills in the harsh mountains of Okinawa's NTA, moving themselves and their equipment miles over the jagged and thickly-forested peaks, and through steep and viscously muddy draws in the landscape.

The unique skills to be successful in this environment did not come to the Marines of 2/2 and 3/3 by chance. Rather, JWX displayed the culmination of nearly a year of training taking place during and prior to their deployments which enabled their forces to successfully execute what amounted to a complex, lengthy, and large-scale combat rehearsal for littoral warfare.

"All members of our team repeatedly practiced and became proficient operating in this type of terrain prior to JWX, which was a significant advantage in this combat rehearsal," said Cpl. Justin Rohn, a squad leader with 3/3 and native of San Bernardino, California, who emphasized the value of training at the Jungle Warfare Training Center earlier in his deployment.

The exercise allowed both infantry battalions to showcase their aptitude to not only survive, but to effectively employ the skills and tactics required to gain and maintain control contested terrain in an incredibly unforgiving littoral environment.

"We train in austere environments, we survive, we sustain, and we do whatever is needed to win," said Staff Sgt. Joshua Long, current operations chief with 4th Marines originally from Thurmont, Maryland.

"This type of training reinforces our ability to capture small islands," added 1st Lt. Matthew Cole, a platoon commander with 3/3 and Grant Pass, Oregon, native who led the formation of combat rubber raiding craft in the amphibious assault.

Integration with joint partners provided opportunities to incorporate specialized capabilities from the U.S. Army 1st Special Forces Group, U.S. Air Force 33rd Rescue Squadron, U.S. Navy Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron 85, and the U.S. Space Force monitoring operations and providing feedback in support of signature management assessment. Support from elements of III Marine Expeditionary Force included amphibious reconnaissance from 3d Recon Battalion, logistics support from Combat Logistics Battalion 4, long-range precision fires capabilities from 3d Battalion, 12th Marines, and assault support and casualty evacuation capabilities from 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.

"This exercise demonstrates that III MEF is ready right now to fight against a thinking enemy in defense of an island, incorporating littoral maneuver across domains," said Col. Matthew Tracy, commanding officer of 4th Marines and seasoned combat veteran with experience in Iraq, Afghanistan, Kosovo, and the Western Pacific. "We are creating the most strenuous, difficult, and demanding training environments to grow our warfighting prowess."


